In our worship on Monday, the 'Voice for Change' club launched the Fairtrade Easter Egg Competition. More details and instructions are further on in this newsletter.


On Thursday, we celebrated World Book Day. Thank you to Mrs Barnes for all her hardwork in organising.

Reflection Time

William Archibald Spooner

This week in our worship, we looked at being forgiving even when people may say or do things that are sometimes hurtful. We heard about the Reverend William Archibald Spooner, who became famous because he got his words muddled all the time. Many have called his examples 'spoonerisms'. He was a good person and what he said was funny. Sometimes though we mix up our words but in a way that is not funny and hurts people. The Reverend Spooner didn't mean to mix up his words, but, sadly there are times when we do mean to say something unkind or hurtful. We heard from the New Testament as Jesus knew exactly what it was like to have people say unpleasant things about him and to treat him unfairly. Jesus' reaction was to reply wit goodness and love. When we make a mistake and say something that hurts, we have to be ready to say sorry and try hard not to make the same mistake again.

Voice for Change Club

Every Wednesday, we attend a Year 6 Voice for Change Club with Mr Ashmore. At the moment, we are focusing on Fairtrade. We strongly feel as a group that people should be paid fairly for the products that they grow or produce. Some people are paid unfairly, which we think is unfair especially with all the hard work they put into growing/ making the items. We've talked to all of the children in worship about how we can help and also about making Fairtrade choices in the shops. Even making one Fairtrade choice e.g. switching to Fairtrade bananas will make a difference! Cop Lane are hoping to achieve becoming a 'Fairaware' school, which would be the first of 3 awards. Our ultimate aim is to become a 'Fairachieving school'.










































How to Make a Fairtrade Papier Mache Easter Egg

Paper Mache is a bit messy and it's also fun to do!



What you will need:

- Balloons
- Bowl, covered in plastic wrap
- Newspaper, cut or torn into strips
- Flour
- White glue (optional)
- Paint (acrylic works well and is waterproof)

INSTRUCTIONS

Before you begin making your eggs, you need to:

- Blow up a balloon and place in a plastic wrap-covered bowl.
- Tear or cut newspaper into small strips.
- Plain white paper.
- Make the papier-mache paste: whisk 1 part flour to 2 parts water. Stir in some white, PVA glue if you like.

To apply paper strips to balloon:

Step 1. Dip each newspaper strip in the paste, then smooth onto the surface of the balloon.

Step 2. Continue adding paste-covered strips of newspaper until the balloon is completely covered with at least two layers of newspaper.

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Step 3. Let the balloons dry completely (this can take 2-3 days)

Step 4. Painted your egg with a coat of white acrylic paint first, and let it dry (acrylic dries quickly), this will prevent newspaper text and images from showing through on your finished eggs.

Alternatively, if you don't have any white acrylic, use plain white paper for your final layer of the Papier Mache instead of newspaper.

Step 4. Once you have a blank canvas, now you can paint your Papier Mache egg!

NB Depending on the type of paint you use, you may need to add a coat of varnish to ensure it is waterproofed.

Use your imagination and paint the egg in bright colours. Remember - the theme is Fairtrade and we'd like you to include somewhere on your egg the Fairtrade logo - this can be as small or large as you wish.
