Cop Lane C.E Primary School Online Safety Policy 2024 - 2025



This policy is embedded in our school's mission statement and distinctive Christian vision:

A welcoming Christian community, committed to one another, giving our very best at all times.

Our church school is a welcoming and caring Christian family where everyone is valued and supported so that they can flourish. We aim to in still a lifelong love of learning and nurture everyone's individual talents. Through Jesus Christ, our aspirations, hopes and dreams can be achieved.

This policy is embedded in our school's mission statement and distinctive Christian vision:

1. Our school aims to:

- > Have robust processes in place to ensure the online safety of pupils, staff, volunteers and governors
- > Deliver an effective approach to online safety, which empowers us to protect and educate the whole school community in its use of technology, including mobile and smart technology (which we refer to as 'mobile phones')
- > Establish clear mechanisms to identify, intervene and escalate an incident, where appropriate

The 4 key categories of risk:

Our approach to online safety is based on addressing the following categories of risk:

- > Content being exposed to illegal, inappropriate or harmful content, such as pornography, fake news, racism, misogyny, self-harm, suicide, anti-Semitism, radicalisation and extremism
- > Contact being subjected to harmful online interaction with other users, such as peer-to-peer pressure, commercial advertising and adults posing as children or young adults with the intention to groom or exploit them for sexual, criminal, financial or other purposes
- > Conduct personal online behaviour that increases the likelihood of, or causes, harm, such as making, sending and receiving explicit images (e.g. consensual and non-consensual sharing of nudes and semi-nudes and/or pornography), sharing other explicit images and online bullying; and
- > Commerce risks such as online gambling, inappropriate advertising, phishing and/or financial scam

2. Scope of the policy:

- This policy applies to all members of the school community (including staff, pupils, volunteers, parents/carers, visitors, community users) who have access to and are users of school digital technology systems, both in and out of the school.
- This policy is based on the Department for Education's (DfE) statutory safeguarding guidance, <u>Keeping Children Safe in Education</u>, and its advice for schools on:
 - Teaching online safety in schools
 - o Preventing and tackling bullying and cuber-bullying: advice for headteachers and school staff
 - Relationships and sex education
 - o Searching, screening and confiscation
- It also refers to the DfE's guidance on protecting children from radicalisation.
- It reflects existing legislation, including but not limited to the <u>Education Act 2006</u> (as amended), the <u>Education Act 2011</u>, which has given teachers stronger powers to tackle cyber-bullying by, if necessary, searching for and deleting inappropriate images or files on pupils' electronic devices where they believe there is a 'good reason' to do so.
- The policy also takes into account the National Curriculum computing programmes of study.

3. Roles and Responsibilities:

- The governing board has overall responsibility for monitoring this policy and holding the headteacher to account for its implementation. The governing board will co-ordinate regular meetings with appropriate staff to discuss online safety, and monitor online safety logs as provided by the designated safeguarding lead (DSL).
- The governor who oversees online safety is Harriet Cookson.

All governors will:

- Ensure that they have read and understand this policy
- Agree and adhere to the terms on acceptable use of the school's ICT systems and the internet (appendix 4)

- Ensure that, where necessary, teaching about safeguarding, including online safety, is adapted for vulnerable children, victims of abuse and some pupils with SEND because of the importance of recognising that a 'one size fits all' approach may not be appropriate for all children in all situations, and a more personalised or contextualised approach may often be more suitable.
- Regularly review the effectiveness of school filters and monitoring systems. They will ensure that school leaders and staff are aware of the systems in place for online safety and manage them effectively, escalating concerns when identified.

Headteacher:

- The Headteacher has a duty of care for ensuring the safety (including online safety) of members of the school community. The online safety lead works in conjunction with the headteacher to monitor online safety within school.
- The Headteacher and another member of the Senior Leadership Team should be aware of the procedures to be followed in the event of a serious online safety allegation being made. Whether this is against a pupil, or another member of the school community (see against a member of staff (see flow chart on dealing with online safety incidents included in a later section "Responding to incidents of misuse" and relevant Local Authority procedures).
- The Headteacher is responsible for ensuring that the Online Safety Lead and other relevant staff receive suitable training to enable them to carry out their online safety roles and to train other colleagues, as relevant.
- > The Headteacher will ensure that there is a system in place to allow for monitoring and support of those in school who carry out the internal online safety monitoring role. This is to provide a safety net and also support to those colleagues who take on important monitoring roles.
- The headteacher will receive regular monitoring reports from the Online Safety Lead.

Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL):

- Details of the school's DSL responsibilities are set out in our child protection and safeguarding policy as well as relevant job descriptions.
- Our DSLs are: Mr I. Ashmore (Headteacher and main DSL), Mrs G. Barnes (Deputy Headteacher and deputy DSL), Mrs S. Hodgson (Back up DSL/ senior teacher) and Miss G. Westgarth (SENCo/ back up DSL)
- The DSL takes lead responsibility for online safety in school, in particular:
 - Supporting the headteacher in ensuring that staff understand this policy and that it is being implemented consistently throughout the school
 - Working with the headteacher, online safety lead, ICT manager and other staff, as necessary, to address any online safety issues or incidents
 - o Managing all online safety issues and incidents in line with the school child protection policy
 - Ensuring that any online safety incidents are logged and dealt with appropriately in line with this policy
 - Ensuring that any incidents of cyber-bullying are logged and dealt with appropriately in line with the school behaviour policy
 - o Updating and delivering staff training on online safety
 - Liaising with other agencies and/or external services if necessary
 - o Providing regular reports on online safety in school to the governing board

Online Safety Lead

- Leads the Online Safety Group
- Has a leading role in establishing and reviewing the school online safety policies/documents
- Ensures that all staff are aware of the procedures that need to be followed in the event of an online safety incident taking place
- Provides training and advice for staff
- Liaises with the Local Authority/MAT/relevant body
- Liaises with school technical staff

- > Receives reports of online safety incidents and creates a log of incidents to inform future online safety developments
- Meets regularly with Online Safety Governor to discuss current issues, review incident logs and filtering/change control logs
- Attends relevant meetings of Governors
- Reports regularly to Senior Leadership Team

Technical Staff

Those with technical responsibilities are responsible for ensuring:

- 'LCC, Netsweeper & Dakol Limited ensure that the school's technical infrastructure is secure and is not open to misuse or malicious attack
- that staff may only access the networks and devices through a properly enforced password protection policy
- the filtering policy is applied and updated on a regular basis and that its implementation is not the sole responsibility of any single person
- that they keep up to date with online safety technical information in order to effectively carry out their online safety role and to inform and update others as relevant
- that the misuse of the networks/internet/digital is reported to the Headteacher and Senior Leaders; Online Safety Lead, DSL (where appropriate) for investigation/action/sanction

All Staff and Volunteers

All staff, including contractors and agency staff, and volunteers are responsible for:

- Maintaining an understanding of this policy
- > Implementing this policy consistently
- Agreeing and adhering to the terms on acceptable use of the school's ICT systems and the internet and ensuring that pupils follow the school's terms on acceptable use (appendices 1 and 2)
- Working with the DSL to ensure that any online safety incidents are logged and dealt with appropriately in line with this policy
- Ensuring that any incidents of cyber-bullying are dealt with appropriately in line with the school behaviour policy
- Responding appropriately to all reports and concerns about sexual violence and/or harassment, both online and offline and maintaining an attitude of 'it could happen here'

The Online Safety Group

- The Online Safety Group provides a consultative group that has wide representation from the school community, with responsibility for issues regarding online safety and the monitoring the Online Safety Policy including the impact of initiatives. The group will also be responsible for regular reporting to the Governing Board.
- Members of the Online Safety Group will assist the Online Safety Lead (or other relevant person, as above) with:
 - o the production/review/monitoring of the school online safety policy/documents.
 - o mapping and reviewing the online safety/digital literacy curricular provision ensuring relevance, breadth and progression
 - o monitoring network/internet/filtering/incident logs
 - o consulting stakeholders including parents/carers and the pupils about the online safety provision

Pupils

- are responsible for using the school digital technology systems in accordance with the pupil acceptable use agreement
- have a good understanding of research skills and the need to avoid plagiarism and uphold copyright regulations (as covered in the online safety curriculum)
- > need to understand the importance of reporting abuse, misuse or access to inappropriate materials and know how to do so
- will be expected to know and understand policies on the use of mobile devices and digital cameras. They should also know and understand policies on the taking/use of images and on online-bullying (as covered in the online safety curriculum)

should understand the importance of adopting good online safety practice when using digital technologies out of school and realise that the school's online safety policy covers their actions out of school, if related to their membership of the school

Parents / Carers

Parents / carers are expected to:

- > Notify a member of staff or the headteacher of any concerns or queries regarding this policy
- > Ensure their child has read, understood and agreed to the terms on acceptable use of the school's ICT systems and internet (appendices 1 and 2)

Parents / carers can seek further quidance on keeping children safe online from the following organisations and websites:

Visitors and members of the community

Visitors and members of the community who use the school's ICT systems or internet will be made aware of this policy, when relevant, and expected to read and follow it. If appropriate, they will be expected to agree to the terms on acceptable use (appendix 3 and 4).

4. Teaching Online Safety

- Pupils will be taught about online safety as part of the curriculum (discretely, through computing and through PSHE / RSE)
- Where necessary, teaching about safeguarding, including online safety, will be adapted for vulnerable children, victims of abuse and some pupils with SEND.

In Key Stage 1, pupils will be taught to:

- 1. Use technology safely and respectfully, keeping personal information private
- 2. Identify where to go for help and support when they have concerns about content or contact on the internet or other online technologies

Pupils in Key Stage 2 will be taught to:

- 3. Use technology safely, respectfully and responsibly
- 4. Recognise acceptable and unacceptable behaviour
- 5. Identify a range of ways to report concerns about content and contact

By the end of primary school, pupils will know:

- 6. That people sometimes behave differently online, including by pretending to be someone they are not
- 7. That the same principles apply to online relationships as to face-to-face relationships, including the importance of respect for others online including when we are anonymous
- 8. The rules and principles for keeping safe online, how to recognise risks, harmful content and contact, and how to report them
- 9. How to critically consider their online friendships and sources of information including awareness of the risks associated with people they have never met
- 10. How information and data is shared and used online
- 11. What sorts of boundaries are appropriate in friendships with peers and others (including in a digital context)

- 12. How to respond safely and appropriately to adults they may encounter (in all contexts, including online) whom they do not know
- 13. The safe use of social media and the internet will also be covered in other subjects where relevant.

5. Training

Parents / Carers

Many parents and carers have only a limited understanding of online safety risks and issues, yet they play an essential role in the education of their children and in the monitoring/regulation of the children's online behaviours. Parents / carers may underestimate how often children and young people come across potentially harmful and inappropriate material on the internet and may be unsure about how to respond.

The school will therefore seek to provide information and awareness to parents and carers through:

- 1. Letters, newsletters, the school website
- 2. Parents/carers evenings/sessions/ termly online workshops
- 3. High profile events/campaigns e.g. Safer Internet Day
- 4. Reference to the relevant web sites/publications (as referenced in section 3 and on the school's online safety page on our website)
- > Staff will share information with parents/carers about the systems in place to filter and monitor online use including which sites children are accessing and who they will be interacting with online.

The Wider Community

The school will provide opportunities for local community groups/members of the community to gain from the school's online safety knowledge and experience. This may be offered through the following:

- o Providing family learning courses in use of new digital technologies, digital literacy and online safety
- Online safety messages targeted towards grandparents and other relatives as well as parents
- o The school website will provide online safety information for the wider community
- o Sharing their online safety expertise/good practice with other local schools

Staff and Volunteers

It is essential that all staff receive online safety training and understand their responsibilities, as outlined in this policy. Training will be offered as follows:

- Online safety training will be made available to staff. This will be regularly updated and reinforced. An audit of the online safety training needs of all staff will be carried out regularly.
- O All new staff should receive online safety training as part of their induction programme, ensuring that they fully understand the school online safety policy and acceptable use agreements.
- It is expected that some staff will identify online safety as a training need within the performance management process.
- The Online Safety Lead will receive regular updates through attendance at external training events (e.g. from SWGfL/LA/other relevant organisations) and by reviewing guidance documents released by relevant organisations.
- This online safety policy and its updates will be presented to and discussed by staff in staff/team meetings/ INSET days.
- o The Online Safety Lead will provide advice/quidance/training to individuals as required.

Governors

Governors should take part in online safety training/awareness sessions, with particular importance for those who are members of any group involved in technology/online safety/health and safety /safeguarding. This may be offered in a number of ways:

- Attendance at training provided by the Local Authority/MAT/National Governors Association/or other relevant organisation (e.g. SWGfL).
- Participation in school training/information sessions for staff or parents (this may include attendance at assemblies/lessons).

6. Technical – Filtering and Monitoring

- > The school will be responsible for ensuring that the school infrastructure/network is as safe and secure as is reasonably possible and that policies and procedures approved within this policy are implemented. It will also need to ensure that the relevant people named in the above sections will be effective in carrying out their online safety responsibilities:
 - School technical systems will be managed in ways that ensure that the school meets recommended technical requirements
 - o There will be regular reviews and audits of the safety and security of school technical systems
 - o Servers, wireless systems and cabling must be securely located and physical access restricted
 - All users will have clearly defined access rights to school technical systems and devices.
 - All users (at KS2 and above) will be provided with a username by DAKOL who will keep an up-to-date record of
 users and their usernames. Users are responsible for the security of their logins.
 - The "master/administrator" passwords for the school systems, used by the IT technician must also be available to the Headteacher / Computing Subject Leader and kept in a secure place (e.g. school safe)
 - o Internet access is filtered for all users. Illegal content (child sexual abuse images) is filtered by the broadband or filtering provider by actively employing the Internet Watch Foundation CAIC list. Content lists are regularly updated and internet use is logged and regularly monitored. There is a clear process in place to deal with requests for filtering
 - Internet filtering/monitoring should ensure that children are safe from terrorist and extremist material when accessing the internet.
 - Monthly filtering tests are carried out using the SWGfL filtering tool that tests the school's filtering and monitoring. The lead DSL keeps records of this.
 - o The online safety lead receives reports on online activity each day.
 - o The school has provided enhanced/differentiated user-level filtering
 - An appropriate system is in place for users to report any actual/potential technical incident/security breach to the relevant person, as agreed).
 - O Appropriate security measures are in place to protect the servers, firewalls, routers, wireless systems, work stations, mobile devices, etc. from accidental or malicious attempts which might threaten the security of the school systems and data. These are tested regularly. The school infrastructure and individual devices are protected by up-to-date virus software.
 - O An agreed policy is in place for the provision of temporary access of "guests" (e.g. trainee teachers, supply teachers, visitors) onto the school systems. Specific accounts have been created for supply teachers, trainee teachers, etc, and temporary accounts can be made for specific visitors when needed.
 - o An agreed policy is in place that allows forbids staff from downloading executable files and installing programmes on school devices. Staff request for apps / programmes to be downloaded by the administrator. Administrator will further check suitability / appropriateness and then make the decision.
 - O An agreed policy is in place regarding the use of removable media (e.g. memory sticks/CDs/DVDs) by users on school devices. Personal data cannot be sent over the internet or taken off the school site unless safely encrypted or otherwise secured.

7. Mobile Technologies

- Mobile technology devices may be school owned/provided or personally owned and might include: smartphone, tablet, notebook/laptop or other technology that usually has the capability of utilising the school's wireless network. The device then has access to the wider internet which may include the school's learning platform and other cloud-based services such as email and data storage.
- All users should understand that the primary purpose of the use mobile/personal devices in a school context is educational. The mobile technologies policy should be consistent with and inter-related to other relevant school polices including but not limited to the safeguarding policy, behaviour policy, bullying policy, acceptable use policy, and policies around theft or malicious damage. Teaching about the safe and appropriate use of mobile technologies should is an integral part of the school's online safety education programme.
- Year 6 pupils are allowed to bring mobile phones into school but have to give them to their teacher at the start of the day to then be collected only at the end of the day. Children are not permitted to use mobile phones for personal use during the day.

Any inappropriate use may lead to confiscation of their device.

The school acceptable use agreements for staff, pupils and carers will give consideration to the use of mobile technologies.

School owned/provided devices:

- > Staff have access to teacher laptops and iPads to use within teaching and learning.
- Devices can be used in school to support teaching and learning and can be taken out of school for planning / school trips, etc.
- Devices are password protected with school managed passwords (GDPR compliant)
- Photographs that are taken on staff iPads for evidence will be uploaded to the secure public server and then deleted.
- **>** Photographs will not be posted on social media (unless photograph consent sought from parents).
- All devices are connected to the school internet and are filtered by the school filtering system (BT Lancashire)
- Devices are wiped if a teacher leaves school.
- The IT technician is responsible for the management of devices, installation of apps and changing of settings and technical support.
- > Staff have signed the AUP with regards to their usage of devices.
- > Staff have received and are receiving ongoing training to use the devices and are aware of policies linked to device use.

Personal devices:

- Staff and visitors are allowed to use mobile devices in school
- Mobiles are only to be used in designated areas.
- > Staff are given access to the internet through their device. Visitors will not have this access.
- Devices are not given access to networks.
- Staff will not be allowed to use personal devices for school business except for school email accounts
- The school reserves the right to take, examine and search users' devices in the case of misuse this is also included in the behaviour policy
- > Technical support is not available for personal devices
- Taking/storage/use of images on personal devices is forbidden
- The school takes no liability for loss/damage or malfunction following access to the network. However, it is unlikely that any personal devices have access to the network
- Visitors will be informed of school requirements during their induction. Access to the school internet is only given upon request.
- > Pupils are educated about the safe and responsible use of mobile devices as part of the online safety curriculum.

Use of digital and video images

The development of digital imaging technologies has created significant benefits to learning, allowing staff and pupils instant use of images that they have recorded themselves or downloaded from the internet. However, staff, parents/carers and pupils need to be aware of the risks associated with publishing digital images on the internet. Such images may provide avenues for online-bullying to take place. Digital images may remain available on the internet forever and may

cause harm or embarrassment to individuals in the short or longer term. It is common for employers to carry out internet searches for information about potential and existing employees.

The school will inform and educate users about these risks and will implement policies to reduce the likelihood of the potential for harm:

- When using digital images, staff should inform and educate pupils about the risks associated with the taking, use, sharing, publication and distribution of images. In particular they should recognise the risks attached to publishing their own images on the internet e.g. on social networking sites.
- Written permission from parents or carers will be obtained before photographs of pupils are published on the school website/social media/local press
- o In accordance with guidance from the Information Commissioner's Office, parents/carers are welcome to take videos and digital images of their children at school events for their own personal use (as such use in not covered by the Data Protection Act). To respect everyone's privacy and in some cases protection, these images should not be published/made publicly available on social networking sites, nor should parents/carers comment on any activities involving other pupils in the digital/video images.
- Staff and volunteers are allowed to take digital/video images to support educational aims, but must follow school
 policies concerning the sharing, distribution and publication of those images. Those images should only be taken
 on school equipment; the personal equipment of staff should not be used for such purposes.
- O Care should be taken when taking digital/video images that pupils are appropriately dressed and are not participating in activities that might bring the individuals or the school into disrepute.
- O Pupils must not take, use, share, publish or distribute images of others without their permission
- Photographs published on the website, or elsewhere that include pupils will be selected carefully and will comply with good practice guidance on the use of such images.
- o Pupils' full names will not be used anywhere on a website or blog, particularly in association with photographs.

8. Personal Data

> Personal data will be recorded, processed, transferred and made available according to the current data protection legislation.

The school must ensure that:

- it has a Data Protection Policy
- it implements the data protection principles and is able to demonstrate that it does so through use of policies, notices and records.
- it has paid the appropriate fee Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) and included details of the Data Protection Officer (DPO)
- it has appointed an appropriate Data Protection Officer (DPO) who has a high level of understanding of data protection law and is free from any conflict of interest. The school may also wish to appoint a Data Manager and Systems Controllers to support the DPO
- thas an 'information asset register' in place and knows exactly what personal data it holds, where this data is held, why and which member of staff has responsibility for managing it
- the information asset register records the lawful basis for processing personal data (including, where relevant, how consent was obtained and refreshed). Where special category data is processed, an additional lawful basis will have also been recorded
- it will hold only the minimum personal data necessary to enable it to perform its function and it will not hold it for longer than necessary for the purposes it was collected for. The school should develop and implement a 'retention policy" to ensure there are clear and understood policies and routines for the deletion and disposal of data to support this. personal data held must be accurate and up to date where this is necessary for the purpose it is processed for. Have systems in place to identify inaccuracies, such as asking parents to check emergency contact details at suitable intervals
- it provides staff, parents and volunteers with information about how the school looks after their data and what their rights are in a clear Privacy Notice

- procedures must be in place to deal with the individual rights of the data subject, e.g. one of the 8 data subject rights applicable is that of Subject Access which enables an individual to see to have a copy of the personal data held about them (subject to certain exceptions which may apply).
- data Protection Impact Assessments (DPIA) are carried out where necessary. For example, to ensure protection of personal data when accessed using any remote access solutions, or entering into a relationship with a new supplier
- IT system security is ensured and regularly checked. Patches and other security essential updates are applied promptly to protect the personal data on the systems. Administrative systems are securely ring fenced from systems accessible in the classroom/to learners
- it has undertaken appropriate due diligence and has required data processing clauses in contracts in place with any data processors where personal data is processed.
- it understands how to share data lawfully and safely with other relevant data controllers.
- it reports any relevant breaches to the Information Commissioner within 72hrs of becoming aware of the breach in accordance with UK data protection law. It also reports relevant breaches to the individuals affected as required by law. In order to do this, it has a policy for reporting, logging, managing, investigating and learning from information risk incidents.
- If a maintained school, it must have a Freedom of Information Policy which sets out how it will deal with FOI requests.
- all staff receive data protection training at induction and appropriate refresher training thereafter. Staff undertaking particular data protection functions, such as handling requests under the individual's rights, will receive training appropriate for their function as well as the core training provided to all staff.

When personal data is stored on any mobile device or removable media the:

- data must be encrypted and password protected.
- device must be password protected.
- device must be protected by up-to-date virus and malware checking software
- data must be securely deleted from the device, in line with school policy once it has been transferred or its use is complete.

Staff must ensure that they:

- at all times take care to ensure the safe keeping of personal data, minimising the risk of its loss or misuse
- can recognise a possible breach, understand the need for urgency and know who to report it to within the school
- > can help data subjects understands their rights and know how to handle a request whether verbal or written. Know who to pass it to in the school
- where personal data is stored or transferred on mobile or other devices (including USBs) these must be encrypted and password protected.
- will not transfer any school personal data to personal devices except as in line with school policy
- access personal data sources and records only on secure password protected computers and other devices, ensuring that they are properly "logged-off" at the end of any session in which they are using personal data

9. Communications

A wide range of rapidly developing communications technologies has the potential to enhance learning.

The following table shows how the school currently considers the benefit of using these technologies for education outweighs their risks/disadvantages:

When using communication technologies, the school considers the following as good practice:

- The official school email service may be regarded as safe and secure and is monitored. Users should be aware that email communications are monitored.
- > Users must immediately report, to the nominated person in accordance with the school policy, the receipt of any communication that makes them feel uncomfortable, is offensive, discriminatory, threatening or bullying in nature and must not respond to any such communication.
- Any digital communication between staff and pupils or parents/carers (email, social media, chat, blogs, VLE etc) must be professional in tone and content. These communications may only take place on official (monitored) school systems. Personal email addresses, text messaging or social media must not be used for these communications.
- Pupils should be taught about online safety issues, such as the risks attached to the sharing of personal details. They should also be taught strategies to deal with inappropriate communications and be reminded of the need to communicate appropriately when using digital technologies.
- Personal information should not be posted on the school website and only official email addresses should be used to identify members of staff.

10. Protecting Professional Identities

All schools and local authorities have a duty of care to provide a safe learning environment for pupils and staff. Schools and local authorities could be held responsible, indirectly for acts of their employees in the course of their employment. Staff members who harass, engage in online bullying, discriminate on the grounds of sex, race or disability or who defame a third party may render the school or local authority liable to the injured party. Reasonable steps to prevent predictable harm must be in place.

The school provides the following measures to ensure reasonable steps are in place to minimise risk of harm to pupils, staff and the school through:

- o Ensuring that personal information is not published
- Training is provided including: acceptable use; social media risks; checking of settings; data protection; reporting issues.
- o Clear reporting guidance, including responsibilities, procedures and sanctions
- o Risk assessment, including legal risk

School staff should ensure that:

- No reference should be made in social media to pupils, parents/carers or school staff
- > They do not engage in online discussion on personal matters relating to members of the school community
- Personal opinions should not be attributed to the school or local authority/MAT
- > Security settings on personal social media profiles are regularly checked to minimise risk of loss of personal information

When official school social media accounts are established there should be:

- A process for approval by senior leaders
- > Clear processes for the administration and monitoring of these accounts involving at least two members of staff
- > A code of behaviour for users of the accounts
- > Systems for reporting and dealing with abuse and misuse
- Understanding of how incidents may be dealt with under school disciplinary procedures

Personal Use:

- Personal communications are those made via a personal social media accounts. In all cases, where a personal account is used which associates itself with the school or impacts on the school/ academy, it must be made clear that the member of staff is not communicating on behalf of the school with an appropriate disclaimer. Such personal communications are within the scope of this policy
- Personal communications which do not refer to or impact upon the school are outside the scope of this policy
- Where excessive personal use of social media in school is suspected, and considered to be interfering with relevant duties, disciplinary action may be taken

Monitoring of Public Social Media:

- As part of active social media engagement, it is considered good practice to pro-actively monitor the Internet for public postings about the school
- The school should effectively respond to social media comments made by others according to a defined policy or process
- The *school's* use of social media for professional purposes will be checked regularly by the senior risk officer and Online Safety Group to ensure compliance with the school policies.

11. Dealing with Unsuitable / Inappropriate Activities


- Some internet activity e.g. accessing child abuse images or distributing racist material is illegal and would obviously be banned from school and all other technical systems. Other activities e.g. cyber-bullying would be banned and could lead to criminal prosecution. There are however a range of activities which may, generally, be legal but would be inappropriate in a school context, either because of the age of the users or the nature of those activities.
- The school believes that the activities referred to in the following section would be inappropriate in a school context and that users, as defined below, should not engage in these activities in/or outside the school when using school equipment or systems. The school policy restricts usage as follows:

12. Responding to Incidents of Misuse

- This guidance is intended for use when staff need to manage incidents that involve the use of online services. It encourages a safe and secure approach to the management of the incident. Incidents might involve illegal or inappropriate activities (see "User Actions" above).
- If there is any suspicion that the web site(s) concerned may contain child abuse images, or if there is any other suspected illegal activity, refer to the right-hand side of the Flowchart (below) for responding to online safety incidents and report immediately to the police.



Other Incidents:

It is hoped that all members of the school community will be responsible users of digital technologies, who understand and follow school policy. However, there may be times when infringements of the policy could take place, through careless or irresponsible or, very rarely, through deliberate misuse.

In the event of suspicion, all steps in this procedure should be followed:

- Have more than one senior member of staff involved in this process. This is vital to protect individuals if accusations are subsequently reported.
- > Conduct the procedure using a designated computer that will not be used by young people and if necessary, can be taken off site by the police should the need arise. Use the same computer for the duration of the procedure.

- It is important to ensure that the relevant staff should have appropriate internet access to conduct the procedure, but also that the sites and content visited are closely monitored and recorded (to provide further protection).
- > Record the URL of any site containing the alleged misuse and describe the nature of the content causing concern. It may also be necessary to record and store screenshots of the content on the machine being used for investigation. These may be printed, signed and attached to the form (except in the case of images of child sexual abuse see below)
- Once this has been completed and fully investigated the group will need to judge whether this concern has substance or not. If it does, then appropriate action will be required and could include the following:
 - o Internal response or discipline procedures
 - o Involvement by Local Authority/Academy Group or national/local organisation (as relevant).
 - o Police involvement and/or action

If content being reviewed includes images of child abuse, then the monitoring should be halted and referred to the Police immediately. Other instances to report to the police would include:

- o incidents of 'grooming' behaviour
- o the sending of obscene materials to a child
- o adult material which potentially breaches the Obscene Publications Act
- o instances of upskirting
- o criminally racist material
- o promotion of terrorism or extremism
- o offences under the Computer Misuse Act (see User Actions chart above)
- o other criminal conduct, activity or materials

Isolate the computer in question as best you can. Any change to its state may hinder a later police investigation.


- It is important that all of the above steps are taken as they will provide an evidence trail for the school and possibly the police and demonstrate that visits to these sites were carried out for safeguarding purposes. The completed form should be retained by the group for evidence and reference purposes.
- It is more likely that the school will need to deal with incidents that involve inappropriate rather than illegal misuse. It is important that any incidents are dealt with as soon as possible in a proportionate manner, and that members of the school community are aware that incidents have been dealt with. It is intended that incidents of misuse will be dealt with through normal behaviour/disciplinary procedures.

This policy was adopted by the Governing Body in September 2024.



Cop Lane C.E Primary School Acceptable Use Policy — KS1



At Cop Lane C.E Primary School we understand the importance and benefits of using technology to enhance children's learning and its role in computing as a subject. However, we also recognise that safeguards need to be in place to ensure children are kept safe at all times. Therefore, it is important that children are aware of their roles and responsibilities when using technology at school.

Please could parents/carers read and discuss this policy with their child to ensure they understand their roles and responsibilities when using technology at school and then sign for our school records.

This is how we stay safe when we use devices:

- I will ask a teacher or suitable adult if I want to use the computers / tablets
- I will only use activities that a teacher or suitable adult has told or allowed me to use
- I will take care of the computer, iPads and other equipment
- I will ask for help from a teacher or suitable adult if I am not sure what to do or if I think
 I have done something wrong
- I will tell a teacher or suitable adult if I see something that upsets me on the screen
- I know that if I break the rules, I may not be allowed to use a computer / iPad again in the future

Leadership Oversight and Approval

1. I will only use the SeeSaw app to talk to my teacher whilst I am learning at home.

- The adults at school have decided that SeeSaw is the best way for me to be sent my learning whilst I am at home and for me to send my learning back to them.
- 2. My teachers and school adults will only use their school accounts to talk to myself and my adults.
 - O My teachers will use equipment that has been given to them by school where possible.
- 3. My teachers will only answer in school time.
 - School hours 8:45 3:15pm.
- 4. My teachers will post my home learning on SeeSaw in the morning. Other adults in school (the headteacher and other leaders) can see everything we post and everything school adults post.

Data Protection and Security

- 5. Any personal information will be stored safely and will link to the school's data protection policy.
- 6. All remote learning and any other online communication will take place in line with current school confidentiality expectations as outlined in GDPR policy.
- 7. SeeSaw will record my adults, my own and my teacher's activity.
- 8. Adults at school will not record lessons or meetings using personal equipment unless the headteacher / other school leaders agree and have risk assessed it in line with data protection policy requirements.
- 9. Only adults and children of Cop Lane School community will be able to get onto SeeSaw.
- 10. Access to SeeSaw will be managed in line with current IT security expectations.

Behaviour Expectations

- 11. I am expected to behave like I do at school when using SeeSaw. This means that if I am recording a voice note or video, I will use appropriate words and behave as I would do in school. This also applies to typing comments, drawing on SeeSaw, etc.
- 12. Educational resources will be used or shared in line with our existing teaching and learning policies, taking licensing and copyright into account.


Policy Breaches and Reporting Concerns

Acceptable Use Policy Agreement

• I understand that I must use school devices in a responsible way, to ensure that there is no risk to my safety or to the safety and security of the systems and other users.

For my own personal safety:

- I understand that the school will monitor my use of the systems, devices and digital communications.
- I will keep my username and password safe and secure -I will not share it, nor will I try to use any other person's username and password. I understand that I should not write down or store a password where it is possible that someone may steal it.

- I understand that everyone has equal rights to use technology as a resource and:
- I understand that Cop Lane's systems and devices are primarily intended for educational use and that I will not use them for personal or recreational use unless I have permission.
- I will not try (unless I have permission) to make large downloads or uploads that might take up internet capacity and prevent other users from being able to carry out their work.
- I will not use Cop Lane's devices for online gaming, online gambling, internet shopping, file sharing, or video broadcasting (E.G YouTube), unless I have permission of a member of staff to do so.
- I will act as I expect others to act towards me.
- I will respect others' work and property and will not access, copy, remove or otherwise alter any other user's files, without the owner's knowledge and permission.

- I will be polite and responsible when I communicate with others, I will not use strong, aggressive or inappropriate language and I appreciate that others may have different opinions.
- I will not take or distribute images of anyone without their permission.
- I recognise that the school has a responsibility to maintain the security and integrity of the technology it offers me and to ensure the smooth running of the school:
- I understand the risks and will not try to upload, download or access any materials which are illegal or inappropriate or may cause harm or distress to others, nor will I try to use any programmes or software that might allow me to bypass the filtering / security systems in place to prevent access to such materials.
- I will immediately report any damage or faults involving equipment or software, however this may have happened.
- I will not open any hyperlinks in emails or any attachments to emails, unless I know and trust the person / organisation who sent the email, or if I have any concerns about the validity of the email (due to the risk of the attachment containing viruses or other harmful programmes)
- I will not install or attempt to install or store programmes of any type on any school device, nor will I try to alter computer settings.

When using the internet for research or recreation, I recognise that:

- I should ensure that I have permission to use the original work of others in my own work
- Where work is protected by copyright, I will not try to download copies (including music and videos)
- When I am using the internet to find information, I should take care to check that the information that I access is accurate, as I understand that the work of others may not be truthful and may be a deliberate attempt to mislead me.

I understand that I am responsible for my actions, both in and out of school:

- I understand that there will be consequences if I am involved in incidents of inappropriate behaviour, that are covered in this agreement, when I am out of school and where they involve my membership of the school community (examples would be cyber-bullying, use of images or personal information).
- I understand that if I fail to comply with this Acceptable Use Policy Agreement, there will be consequences for my actions. This may include loss of access to the school network / internet, contact with parents and in the event of illegal activities involvement of the police.

I have read and understand the above and agree to follow these guidelines when:

School Policy

Acceptable Use Policy Agreement

- 17. All remote learning and any other online communication will take place in line with current school confidentiality expectations as outlined in GDPR policy.
- 18. All participants will be made aware that seesaw records activity.
- 19. Staff will not record lessons or meetings using personal equipment unless agreed and risk assessed by SLT and in line with our data protection policy requirements.
- 20. Only members of Cop Lane School community will be given access to seesaw.
- 21. Access to seesaw will be managed in line with current IT security expectations.

Behaviour Expectations

- 22. All participants are expected to behave in line with existing school policies and expectations. This includes: appropriate language and communication used when commenting back to teachers via written comment or voice message.
- 23. Educational resources will be used or shared in line with our existing teaching and learning policies, taking licensing and copyright into account.

Policy Breaches and Reporting Concerns

- 24. If inappropriate language or behaviour takes place during remote learning, concerns will be reported to the headteacher.
- 25. Inappropriate online behaviour will be responded to in line with existing policies such as acceptable use of technology, allegations against staff, anti-bullying and behaviour.
- 26. Any safeguarding concerns will be reported to Mr I. Ashmore (Designated Safeguarding Lead), Mrs G.Barnes (Back up DSL), Mrs S.Hodgson (Back up DSL) of Miss G. Westgarth (Back up DSL) in line with our child protection policy.
