













# WORLD BOOK DAY 2025 Cop Lane CE Primary School Thursday 6th March 2025

The theme for this World Book Day is 'Read Your Way' again, encouraging children to read the texts they find interesting and exciting, in the way they like to read, in the place they like to read, to encourage reading for pleasure. A recent report showed that reading for pleasure has declined in children and we want to encourage as much reading as possible at every age, so we will be supporting this again at Cop Lane, as we do every day!



































On World Book Day, your child will be taking part in a variety of activities, including another visit to the 'pop-up bookshop' in the library, where they will be able to use their voucher and choose one of the books available this year, made possible by Peters bookshop. Pupil voice has showed us that the children loved this last year and are looking forward to visiting the 'shop' again!

We are also asking children to dress in the clothes they wear when they 'read their way' on the 6th March. This could be their school uniform, comfy clothes they like to relax in and read, pyjamas if they read at bedtime (although please remember they will still need to play out and will need footwear and a coat suitable for the weather), or a pair of slippers for comfy feet!
