Reflection Time

"'As Jesus went on from there, he saw a man named Matthew sitting at the tax collector's booth. 'Follow me,' he told him, and Matthew got up and followed him."

Matthew 9:9

This week in worship, our theme was 'Serving by Being Respectful.' We explored the different roles people have in society, such as firefighters, police officers, vicars, cleaners, teachers, and paramedics. We discussed how some jobs might not be as popular or well-liked—like traffic wardens—but are still very important. For example, without traffic wardens, people might park wherever they like, which could be dangerous. We also learned about how, in Jesus' time, tax collectors were often disliked because they were sometimes dishonest. They were looked down on and excluded. We heard the story of Matthew, a tax collector who chose to follow Jesus. Jesus welcomed Matthew, asked him to repay what he had taken, and gave him a chance to start again. Jesus always showed respect to others and offered second chances. We talked about how we can follow Jesus' example by making sure everyone is included, respected, and loved.





This week in our Picture News, we looked at the news that the UK government is planning to bring in digital identity cards, which people could keep on their phones or have as a physical card. The idea is that these new IDs would make it easier to prove who you are for things like work, travel or applying for services. Supporters say that they could improve safety and convenience, while others worry about privacy, fairness, and people without access to smartphones. The children considered the question: "Should everyone have an identity card?"

Ways a Parent Can Help with

Let your child see you reading!

Have magazines and books in your home.

Help your child find appropriate reading and word games online.

Keep a dictionary on hand. Help your child look up new words.

Read mysteries with your child and try to figure out the clues together.

4 Movie version coming out?

Read the book together first, then talk about which you each liked better.

Set aside a time and place for your child to read -

like a comfy chair and a reading light in a quiet place

Visit your public library regularly.

> Look for and read together the books that were your favorites when you were a kid.

Encourage your child to write -

letters, thank you notes, emails, journals, lists, stories about their own trips, events, and daily life

Ask your child to draw a comic strip about what happens in the story.

Provide word searches, crossword and other word games and puzzles, or help your child make his/her own

Ask your child questions about what her or she is reading, such as:

- What is the story about?
- Who are the important people in the story?
- Where does the story take place?
 Why do you think that person made that choice?
 What do you think will happen next?
 How did you know about...?

- Would you recommend this book to your friends?



Share with your child about what you're reading... and encourage your child to do the same































Go to school; if needed, get treatment as required



Some restrictions for school attendance



Don't go to school and see the GP

Asthma flare up	Worsening of usual symptoms	>	Follow your care plan	Stay off school if feeling too unwell
Chicken pox	Rash begins as small, red, flat spots that develop into itchy fluid-filled blisters	II	Pharmacy	Back to school five days after on-set of the rash, or when all lesions are crusted over
Common cold	Runny nose, sneezing, sore throat	>>	Pharmacy	Ensure good hand hygiene
Conjunctivitis	Teary, red, itchy, painful eye(s)	>>	Pharmacy	Try not to touch eye to avoid spreading*
Flu	Fever, cough, sneezing, runny nose, headache body aches and pain, exhaustion, sore throat		Pharmacy	Ensure good hand hygiene*
German measles/ Rubella	Fever, tiredness. Raised, red, rash that starts on the face and spreads downwards	•	GP	Back to school four days after the rash has started, if feeling well enough. Please let the school know, as pregnant members of staff may be affected.
Glandular fever	High temperature, swollen glands, sore throat; usually more painful than any before	>>	GP	•
Hand, foot & mouth disease	Fever, sore throat, headache, small painful blisters inside the mouth on tongue and gums (may appear on hands and feet)	>>	GP	Attend school while monitoring symptoms
Head lice	Itchy scalp (may be worse at night)	>>	Pharmacy	
Impetigo	Clusters of red bumps or blisters surrounded by area of redness		GP	Back to school when lesions crust or 48 hours after start of antibiotics
Measles	Fever, cough, runny nose, watery inflamed eyes, rash	•	GP	Back to school four days from on-set of rash, and if feeling well enough
Ringworm	Red ring shaped rash, may be itchy, rash may be dry and scaly or wet and crusty	>>	Pharmacy	
Scabies	Itching rash, commonly between fingers, wrists, elbows, arm	>>	GP	Back to school after first treatment
Scarlet fever	Fever, unwell, red tongue, sandpaper rash		GP	Exclusion period during first 24 hours of antibiotics*
Shingles	Pain, itching, or tingling along the affected nerve pathway. Blister-type rash		GP	Only stay off school if rash is weeping and cannot be covered
Sickness bug/ diarrhoea	Stomach cramps, nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea		Pharmacy	Contact GP if symptoms persist after 48 hours
Threadworms	Intense itchiness around anus	>>	Pharmacy	Ensure good hand hygiene
Tonsilitis/ Strep throat	Intense sore throat for more than 1 day	>>	Pharmacy	See GP if temperature lasts more than 48 hours or cannot swallow . Only need to stay off school if feeling too unwell
Whooping cough	Violent coughing, with a 'whoop'		GP	Exclusion period during first five days of antibiotics














In the news this week
